

What's Happening at the MCSESC!

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

She works with her students on social skills so that they know what to do in social situations. In some school settings she is responsible to teach students how to read and write so that they can be successful outside of school. Also, she is used as a resource for the school districts. If the schools have a student whom they would like her to observe and provide recommendations for, she will do that so the student can be successful in future endeavors. In other schools, she teaches all language arts for the student and if necessary, fills in as an interpreter for the students.

On-Bus-Instructor (OBI) Training with Mike Redfern


E ach year Mike Redfern, North Region Pre-Service School Bus Driver Instructor, holds mandatory meetings for all OBI's in the north region. This year the meetings were held in various locations: Mid-Ohio ESC, Mansfield, Ohio; Ellenwood Recreation Center, Cuyahoga County; Medina County University Center, Medina County; Westlake City Schools, Cuyahoga County; and Fisher-Titus Learning Center, Norwalk, Ohio.

The OBI meetings are held to inform all those in attendance of changes and update in the laws and regulations that bus drivers must abide by and also to recap older laws for themselves and their drivers

Mike distributed information on new CDL testing sites in the state of Ohio. Mike also showed a short informative movie called "Jacob Story." The film is a documentary about a child that was run over by a school bus in Missouri. Jacob's family members decided to get involved to bring this important information about the ten-foot "Safety Zone" around the bus to all parents and bus drivers. Nursing Services Update for January 2014

ori Hogue, Director of School Nursing Services, provided American Heart Association CPR/First Aid training at Buckeye Jr. High School in December. Forty-two girls in Mrs. Acks' health classes received training and course completion cards. The class training topics included CPR, use of an automated external defibrillator, choking, and basic first aid. The course was offered over a week, with all students completing the curriculum requirement for their health class.

Registered Nurse students from The University of Akron worked with the ESC School Nursing staff during the fall of 2013 to complete the community education portion of their training. These students provided nursing care to students in the Buckeye, Cloverleaf, and Medina City School Districts.

The TerraCycle recycling program continues to benefit the Nursing Service program. Together, School Nursing staff members have collected: 86,547 empty juice pouches; 2,573 glue bottles; 1,145 writing instruments; and 145 tape dispensers. These items would have previously ended up in a landfill. Please continue to collect used glue sticks and glue bottles, empty juice pouches, used writing utensils (excluding wooden pencils or crayons), and empty tape dispensers (core or entire plastic piece).

Math 24

n Thursday, January 23, 2014, 80 students from Wadsworth, Medina City, Brunswick, and Cloverleaf competed in the annual Math 24 competition. The competition was held at the Cloverleaf Recreation Center.

This competition requires the students to mathematically convert four individual numbers on a Math 24 card that will equal 24. The process is accomplished by adding, subtracting, dividing or multiplying each number once. Each round is 20 minutes long with three rounds to qualify for the semi-finals.
