

What's Happening at the MCSESC

Entomologist Visits Cloverleaf Primary School

On February 22, 2011, the third and fourth grade students at Seville Elementary learned about the study of entomology from Dr. Mary Gardiner, the director of the Agricultural Landscape Ecology Lab at the Ohio Agriculture Research and Development Center (OARDC) in Wooster, Ohio. Dr. Gardiner talked to the students about her elementary school experience, how she became interested in the study of entomology, and about her current work. After the presentation, students were invited to join the Entomology Club, which was established through a Martha Holden Jennings educational grant. Brandi Killinger, the Gifted Intervention Specialist at Seville, leads the weekly club meetings with the assistance of other teachers and staff members from the school.



During the weekly club meetings, students are learning about current entomology research, careers related to entomology, and the education and skills needed to pursue a career in entomology. During the first club meeting, students discovered how to determine whether a bug is an insect or another type of animal and how all plants and animals are classified. During our second session, students followed the step-by-step tutorial video prepared by Connie Hurt of Butterflies and Things on how to prepare and spread a butterfly or moth for display. After the butterflies and moths dried, they were added to the insect collections for further study. Club members also learned about the physical and behavior characteristics of moths and butterflies and how to tell them apart.



Insect adaptations and the morphology of insects were also investigated during the club meetings. Students explored how insects' mouths, legs, and other body parts are

adapted to meet the challenges of surviving in their habitats. They also experienced firsthand, how entomologists and other scientists struggle to identify and classify living things using established dichotomous keys. Students rose to the challenge at a recent club meeting by successfully preparing morphological illustrations of insect specimens.



In future meetings, entomology club members will learn more about Dr. Mary Gardiner's citizen research project, the Buckeye Lady Beetle Blitz. Students will review the data-gathering process currently being employed by the researchers at the Agricultural Landscape Ecology Lab, analyze the data collected during the first two years of the study, and finally, make predictions regarding the population of lady beetles living in Ohio.

The Robofest World Competition was held on May 7, 2011, at Lawrence Technological University in Southfield, Michigan, and included the participation of several local teams that had advanced from the Medina Robofest Qualifier and then the Regional Robofest Competition. The Medina Robofest Qualifier was held on March 26, 2011, at the Medina County University Center and involved 34 teams of students in grades 4-8



representing Highland, Cloverleaf, Wadsworth, and Medina School Districts. The Qualifier was coordinated by Brenda Magier of the Medina County Schools' ESC and sponsored by MTD Products, Inc.,

the Martha Holden Jennings Foundation, and the Medina County University Center.

World Robofest was an exciting day of Robotics competition that culminated in the awards ceremony, where three local teams took home trophies. In the Exhibition category, RoboNerds from Hinckley Elementary took 2nd place with their exhibit that demonstrated how robots could be used to cure cancer. In the RoboFashion and Dance Show category, Space Rebels, also from Hinckley, took the 2nd place trophy for their Star Wars themed robotics show. The Robobees, from Claggett Middle School in Medina, took home the People's Choice Award for the Exhibition category. Also participating in the World Competition was NXT (Nuclear Xtraction Technique) Power from Highland Middle School. Congratulations to all of these teams and their coaches on their accomplishments. All of these students spent a remarkable amount of time preparing their Robotics projects, and the results showed it! As judges interviewed them throughout the day, they were very impressed with their creativity and with how much the students had learned about science, technology, engineering, and math as demonstrated by their final projects.
