

What's Happening at the MCSESC

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Substitute Teacher Training Class

The Medina County Schools' Educational Service Center (MCSESC) is now in its fourth year of requiring substitutes' participation in specific training prior to their working in schools in the county. The training requirement is part of the MCSESC's substitute teacher services provided to school districts in Medina County. The class is required for all Medina County substitutes who hold a "sub only" license and for subs who are fully licensed as educators, but who have not had full-time employment experience as teachers.

The Substitute Training Class was created when administrators from area school districts and from the MCSESC became concerned about the varying levels of knowledge and skills with which guest teachers, especially those who have not been trained and licensed as educators, enter the classroom. Subsequently, ESC staff members designed a one-day training based on proven practices and principles outlined by the Substitute Teaching Institute at Utah State University.

During the class, instructors model and provide participants with practice in using a variety of classroom management and instructional techniques. They also provide information on guest teachers' roles and responsibilities, expectations for professionalism, special education and current legal issues in education, and first aid and safety procedures. The substitutes leave the training with a 'substitute bag" containing needed supplies for their first few assignments as guest teachers. They may also choose to purchase a copy of the <u>Substitute Teacher Handbook</u> (Substitute Teaching Division, STEDI, 2009) which is used as the text during the class.

The class has helped to establish common expectations for guest teachers and has promoted specific preferred teaching and management strategies for substitutes who work in the schools in Medina County. Substitutes have reported that they feel more confident in their abilities and more comfortable that they are fully knowledgeable about what is expected of them as guest teachers after they take the Substitute Orientation Training Program.


