


2016 Tom Magier Pursuit of Excellence Award



On Monday, March 28, 2016, the first annual, "Tom Magier Pursuit of Excellence Award" was presented at the Buckeye Wrestling Awards Program. The plaque was presented by former Buckeye coach, Tom Magier, to Nick Neitenbach. He is the son of Dylan and Nicole Neitenbach, both former students of Mr. Magier. Dylan also wrestled for Buckeye back in the 1980's.

Junior High coaches John Dalglish and Mike Tecco, also former students, wrestlers and football players for Magier created this award. "Mr. Magier was our coach in junior high football and wrestling when we attended Buckeye and we wanted to have an award to honor him in some way because he was a big part of the success we had. We named it the Tom Magier Pursuit of Excellence award for the

wrestler that was the most deserving. This will be an ongoing award from year to year for the wrestler that exemplified a solid work ethic, a highly competitive nature and displayed strong leadership qualities throughout the wrestling season."

Tom Magier taught English, reading and history for 30 years at Buckeye, and also coached wrestling, football and track during many of those years. He is currently the Director/teacher of the Alternative School at the ESC of Medina County, where he and the staff help students to recover credits and earn their high school diplomas. He is married to Brenda and lives in Munroe Falls, and has two married children Jake (Shannon) of Portland, Oregon and Nicole (Tim) of Medina, and three grandchildren, Isabelle in Medina, and Holden and Harlow in Portland.

Fourth Annual Educators' Symposium


The ESC of Medina County is excited to present our Fourth Annual Ohio Educators' Symposium will be held June 6-9, 2016, at the Medina County Career Center.

Educational Service Center of Medina County Summer Enrichment Program 2016

The MCSESC Summer Enrichment Program is designed for school age students (K-grade 3; grades 4-7; grades 8-10) who can benefit from a structured and relevant small group environment with a focus on building personal and social confidence. Classes will be developed based on grade and skill level. Our program is structured to provide students who struggle with social situations a vehicle to practice social skills within a small group setting and opportunities to generalize those skills in the community. Specific IEP goals can be addressed as well.



This program is classroom based three days per week and community based 1 day per week. Students will receive direct instruction in appropriate social skills, time to practice skills in the classroom environment, and opportunities to demonstrate skills in the community. Instruction is focused on "learning by doing" and features real life social situations. Students will work with an Intervention Specialist and Board Certified Behavior Analyst (BCBA). Occupational therapy will be available through a partnership with ABC Therapy, and speech therapy will be available as well.

At the start of each week, the students will summarize, through group discussion, the events of the preceding week. The discussion will include identification of target skills, student perspective, teacher perspective, and other opportunities for application of skills. Throughout the week students will work cooperatively with each other through turn taking activities, small group projects, and preparation for planned outing.

Parent/Guardian involvement is crucial to the child's social skills development and improvement. The instructor will communicate with parents at the end of each session with a daily report on student participation and behavior through a checklist. At the end of the program the Parents/Guardians will be invited to a luncheon where the students will share the skills acquired and developed during the program.

Registration due date is May 27, 2016

Tuition for the program is \$1,250 per student.
