Nurses' Corner

Eye injuries

 According to the American Academy of Ophthalmology, more



than 40 percent of eye injuries occur during a sports-related activity. Nearly half of all eye injuries occur in the home from activities like cooking, cleaning, and yard work. According to the national survey conducted by the AAO, more than a third (34.2 percent) of home eye injuries occurred in the living areas, such as the kitchen, bathroom, living room, and bedroom.

- Eye injuries from work do not have to include high-risk activities, such as welding or machinery. Even employees who work in offices run the risk of developing eye injuries.
- Be prepared to wear proper eye protection, eliminate any hazards before starting the job, and always be aware of those working around you.

School Bus Driver's Corner

- Currently the Pre-Service Program is conducting classes and issuing bus/van driver certifications and On-Bus Instructor certifications.
- The Ohio Association for Pupil Transportation (OAPT) honored the Pre-Service Program for 35 years of service at the state conference March 17-22. This year the OAPT presented the Pre-Service Region Instructors with a plaque honoring the 2004 National Award for School Bus Driver Safety Training, which had been lost at the time.
- We are also presenting programs two days at the State Conference highlighting our history and our future projects. There will be four breakout sessions on Defensive Driving, Distracted Driving, Pre-Trip Inspections, and Designated Place of Safety for Pupils.
- Most of all, we are focusing on driving safety, student safety, and the importance of supervisors, on-bus instructors, and bus drivers taking the extra step to make a difference as they continue to work in school transportation.
