Competition in the job market, fear of contracting COVID, and a general decline in the number of college students graduating with an education degree have contributed to the decline in the substitute teacher pool.

Many potential candidates are not aware that you do not need to have a bachelor's degree in education to become a substitute teacher. In some cases, depending on the district, a bachelor's degree is not needed for the 2021/22 school year.

### TRENDS IN EDUCATION: Virtual Academy

The ESC Virtual Academy enrollment is currently 220 students from nine districts. Seven of the districts are in Medina County.

Literacy is the foundation for learning. Kindergarten students have read 621 books; first graders have read 955 books on Epic! The third grade has read 1,361 books on Epic and completed four chapter books during daily read-aloud time after lunch. The fourth-grade class has collectively read 2,006 books on Epic for a total of 444 hours!

Third graders recently learned about different family and holiday traditions around the world. Students were allowed to teach lessons to the class about their families' cultures. Some different countries/cultures we learned about included China, Russia/Ukraine, India, Mexico, and Germany! Throughout this unit, students also worked with families to write a family recipe in a Holiday Recipe Book, highlighting different cultural dishes from around the world.

The Creative Writing Club is booming with over 20 kids who are writing some amazing stories! Some of these stories will be featured on the school website and blog as well.

### IN THE SPOTLIGHT

For over 30 years, Parent Mentors of Ohio have helped families of children with exceptionalities to navigate state and federal special education processes and services so that those children can access schooling in a way that is individualized and meaningful and sets the students up for success.

Parent Mentors are parents of children with disabilities. They are peers and mentors who help to empower families to become positive advocates for their children. They review ETRs, IEPs, behavior plans, attend meetings with families, and serve as a sounding board to problem solve challenges during the special education process.

Parent Mentors also work to facilitate positive relationships between families and the school districts in which they live. This allows the entire team to work together proactively to support the child. Districts can refer families to Parent Mentors for support.

All Medina County families have access, free of charge, to Parent Mentor services through grant funding from the Ohio Department of Education.
